

## WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

To either of the Constables in the Town of Oak Bluffs, **Greetings:**

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Oak Bluffs who are qualified to vote in Town Affairs and Elections, to assemble at the Martha's Vineyard High School Performing Arts Center, Edgartown-Vineyard Haven Road, Oak Bluffs, on Tuesday, April 9, 2013 at 7:00 p.m. in the evening, then and there to hear the reports and act upon the following articles.

**Article 1.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and/or transfer from available funds the sum of \$25,491,608 and transfer and appropriate from the Wastewater Enterprise Fund the sum of \$1,509,051 to fund and pay the departmental expenses and Town debt for the ensuing fiscal year 2014, July 1 2013 through June 30, 2014 or take any action relative thereto.

### **Board of Selectmen**

**Executive Summary:** This article establishes the Fiscal Year 2014 Annual budgets for the various Town Departments as outlined in the attached Appendix A. Appendix C includes a budget worksheet showing sub-detailed line items.

**Finance and Advisory Board Recommendation: 7-yes, 1-no**

**Article 2.** To see if the Town will vote to adopt Schedule A, Classification Schedule, and Schedule B, Compensation Schedule of the Personnel Bylaws **(Appendix B)** or take any action relative thereto.

### **Personnel Board**

**Executive Summary:** This annual article sets the classifications and compensation ranges for Town employees under the Personnel Board purview. The compensation schedule reflects the implementation of the step increases discussed

**Finance and Advisory Board Recommendation: 7-yes, 1-no**

**Article 3.** To see if the Town, upon recommendation of the Board of Selectmen will vote as authorized by MGL Chapter 44, section 53E ½ to re-establish a revolving fund for Department 296, Marina, under the direction of the Harbormaster for the purpose of paying harbor related costs, to be funded from surcharge receipts collected from all transient visitors and to establish an annual limit of \$15,000 of expenditures, or take any action relative thereto.

### **Harbormaster**

**Executive Summary:** This article annually reauthorized the Marina Revolving Account, which is funded through a \$1.50 surcharge on all transient visitors. The collected money is used to offset the cost of harbor area infrastructure improvements such as piling repair and small dredging, and to remediate environmental impacts to the harbor such as small oil spills. The estimate of annual revenues and expenditures to this account are not to exceed \$15,000.

**Article 4.** To see if the Town will raise and appropriate or transfer from the Stabilization Fund the sum of \$45,172 (Forty-Five Thousand one hundred seventy-two dollars) for the Martha's Vineyard Regional High School District to be used for architectural fees for the design of a new Superintendent's Office building on the high school campus as recommended by the 2012 feasibility study.

**Executive Summary:** This article funds the Town's share of the cost of the development of architectural plans for the design of a new Superintendent's Office building on the High School Campus.

**Finance and Advisory Board Recommendation: 1-yes, 7-no**

**Article 5.** To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of \$118,800 (one hundred eighteen thousand eight hundred dollars) from the Ambulance Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing 3 (three) marked police cruisers or take any other action relative thereto.

**Police Department**

**Capital Program Committee**

**Executive Summary:** The purchase of these vehicles will replace the current 2010 marked police cruisers in accordance with year two of the public safety five year capital improvement plan. These purchases will occur in January 2014 and will be inclusive of the vehicles and all necessary vehicle equipment.

**Finance and Advisory Board Recommendation: 7-yes, 1-no**

**Article 6.** To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Ambulance Reserve Fund the amount of \$14,000 (fourteen thousand dollars) for the purchase of a Lucas 2 CPR System or take any other action relative thereto.

**Ambulance Department**

**Capital Program Committee**

**Executive Summary:** This article funds the purchase of a CPR System for the Ambulance. This advanced life support equipment is necessary to equip an ambulance with modern life saving technology that provides constant, deep CPR while paramedics may perform additional tasks. This purchase is recommended in the Capital Improvement Program

**Finance and Advisory Board Recommendation: 8-yes, 0-no**

**Article 7.** To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Ambulance Reserve Fund the amount of \$12,000 (twelve thousand dollars) to upgrade radio communications or take any other action relative thereto.

**Ambulance Department**

**Capital Program Committee**

**Executive Summary:** This article funds an upgrade in the ambulance radio communication system for our ambulance system. This will fund the purchase of two ambulance base units and hand held units for new paramedics. This purchase is recommended in the Capital Improvement Program

**Finance and Advisory Board Recommendation: 8-yes, 0-no**

**Article 8.** To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Ambulance Reserve Fund the amount of \$100,000 (one hundred thousand dollars) for the purchase of Scott Air Packs or take any other action relative thereto.

**Fire Department**

**Capital Program Committee**

**Executive Summary:** This article funds the purchase of new Scott Air Packs for the Fire Department as recommended in the Capital Improvement Program. The older units have outlived their certification time period and require replacement.

**Finance and Advisory Board Recommendation: 8-yes, 0-no**

**Article 9.** To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Ambulance Reserve Fund the amount of \$100,000 (one hundred thousand dollars) for the first of 5 (five) installments for the lease of a new engine 2 (class A pumper) or take any other action relative thereto.

**Fire Department**

**Capital Program Committee**

**Executive Summary:** This article funds year one of a five-year lease for a new pumper truck for the Fire Department as recommended in the Capital Improvement Program. This needed equipment replacement has been planned to coincide with the end of payments for the Town's ladder truck so that the overall annual fire truck payments will remain constant.

**Finance and Advisory Board Recommendation: 8-yes, 0-no**

**Article 10.** To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to acquire by gift or by right of eminent domain a piece of land (Map 12 Lot 146) that abuts the Oak Grove Cemetery and that has been maintained by the Town for use by the Cemetery Commission for cremation lots or take any other action relative thereto.

**Cemetery Commissioners**

**Executive Summary:** This article seeks to incorporate an “owner unknown” parcel of land that the Town has been maintaining into part of the Oak Grove Cemetery for cremation lots and memorial garden.

**Article 11.** To see if the Town will vote to transfer from Sale of Cemetery Lots the sum of \$10,000 (ten thousand dollars) to Cemetery Perpetual Care (82493 4970) for the upkeep and maintenance of Oak Grove Cemetery or take any other action relative thereto.

**Cemetery Commissioners**

**Executive Summary:** This transfer is requested in order to purchase new equipment and tools for the upkeep of the cemetery grounds. Last time transfer was done was in 2010.

**Finance and Advisory Board Recommendation: 8-yes, 0-no**

**Article 12.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$31,900 (thirty one thousand and nine hundred dollars) for legal and acquisition costs and for landscaping costs and \$188,100 (one hundred eighty eight thousand one hundred dollars) in land purchase expense, for a total appropriation of \$220,000 (two hundred twenty thousand dollars) to enable the Town of Oak Bluffs to acquire for conservation purposes under Chapter 44B, the Community Preservation Act, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept the deed to the town of fee simple interest or less, of a parcel of land at 16 Circuit Avenue, Oak Bluffs consisting of .02 acres of open land identified as Map 9, Lot 10 in the records of the town assessors; a map being on file with the Town Clerk; said land to be managed by the Oak Bluffs Park Commission; and that to meet this appropriation the sum of \$220,000 (two hundred twenty thousand dollars) be transferred from the Undesignated Community Preservation Fund balance; and that the Board of Selectmen be directed to grant a perpetual conservation restriction in said parcel of land meeting the requirements of MGL Chapter 44B sec 12 and MGL Chapter 184 sec 31-33, and to enter into all agreements and execute any and all instruments as may be necessary to affect said purchase, said funds to be expended by the Board of Selectmen, Park Commission and the Community Preservation Committee; or take any other action relative thereto.

**Community Preservation Committee**

**Executive Summary:** This article seeks to purchase and landscape a strip of land connecting Circuit Avenue to the restroom facilities on Kennebec Avenue as a public park and walkway for the public convenience. It is recommended by the Community Preservation Committee as an open space project.

**Finance and Advisory Board Recommendation: 3-yes, 4-no, 1-abstain**

**Article 13.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate or reserve from Community Preservation Funds for Fiscal Year 2014 estimated annual revenues the amounts recommended by the Community Preservation Committee for administrative expenses and Community Preservation projects, with each item to be considered a separate appropriation as follows, or take any other action relative thereto.

**Community Preservation Committee**

**Executive Summary:** This article is required by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts on an annual basis to ensure that Community Preservation Funds are allocated properly, in the amount of at least 10% of total revenues to each of the three required areas of Historic Resources, Community Housing, and Open Space/Recreation. The appropriation for administrative expenses is less than 3% of the collected funds.

**Executive Summary:** This article establishes the local elective offices to appear on the next Town election ballot.

**Article 17.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$975,146 (nine hundred seventy-five thousand one hundred forty-six dollars) to be raised for the purpose of conducting roadway repairs according to a roadway improvement plan approved by the Board of Selectmen, and for the payment of all other costs incidental and related thereto, and that to meet this appropriation, the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, is hereby authorized to borrow said amount under and pursuant to, Chapter 44, Section 7 of the Massachusetts General Laws, or any other enabling authority, and to issue bonds and notes of the Town therefor, or take any other action relating thereto.

**Board of Selectmen**

**Executive Summary:** This article funds the Roadway Improvement plan as approved by the Board of Selectmen to address roads in Town that have been determine to be in poor condition. The funds from the roadway bond will be used in conjunction with State Highway funds to improve the condition of our local roads. Funds used to pay the cost of these bonds will be from declining debt for other projects to minimize any tax rate impacts and this project will be subject to a debt exclusion vote at the Town election. **Finance and Advisory Board Recommendation: 8-yes, 0-no**

**Article 18.** To see if the Town will vote to amend the Oak Bluffs Zoning Bylaw by deleting the current Section 9.0.XIII.1A or take any other action relative thereto:

(6) Uses Requiring Special Permit from the Board of Appeals

- (a) Within the Shore Zone, the Board of Appeals may grant a Special Permit for any of the following:
- (i) Alterations to buildings and additions to existing residential structures, provided that such additions or alteration neither includes nor requires increased plumbing facilities or onsite sanitary disposal facilities.
  - (ii) Fish processing facilities requiring or not requiring onsite sanitary disposal systems.
  - (iii) Minor dredging, filling or alteration of a wetland or beach required for one of the above approved structures or uses.
  - (iv) Repair or replacement of onsite sanitary disposal or sewage treatment facilities, including any structures, devices and appurtenances to be used in connection therewith, provided however, that such repair or replacement constitutes an improvement to the existing disposal or treatment facilities and has been approved by the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection or the Oak Bluffs Board of Health, as appropriate.

In its entirety and substituting in its place the following or take any other action relative thereto.

Section 9.0.XIII.1.A

6. Uses Requiring Special Permit from the Board of Appeals

- a. Within the Shore Zone, the Board of Appeals may grant a Special Permit for any of the following:
  - (i) Alterations to buildings and additions to existing residential structures; provided that such additions or alterations shall not result in additional sewage flow or sewage capacity if said building or structure is served by onsite sewage disposal facilities.
  - (ii) Fish processing facilities require or not requiring onsite sanitary disposal systems.
  - (iii) Minor dredging, filling or alteration of a wetland or beach required for one of the above approved structures or uses.
  - (iv) Repair or replacement of onsite sanitary disposal or sewage treatment facilities, including any structures, devices and appurtenances to be used in connection therewith, provided however, that such repair or replacement constitutes and improvement to the existing disposal or treatment facilities and has been approved by the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection or the Oak Bluffs Board of Health, as appropriate.
  - (v) A structure partially located in the shore zone shall be considered as entirely in the shore zone.

### **Planning Board**

**Executive Summary:** This article amends the zoning requirements for the granting of a special permit by the Zoning Board of Appeals within the Shore Zone by adding new provisions for the repair or replacement of on-site sanitary disposal systems or sewage treatment facilities, and also by clarifying the designation of structures located partially in the shore zone. Approval is required from the Martha's Vineyard Commission under the District of Critical Planning Concern.

**Article 19.** To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 59 Section 5 Clause 54; establishing a limit to the tax exemption allowed under said statute to personal property valued at \$3000 Implementation of this provision will commence in fiscal year 2014.

### **Board of Assessors**

**Executive Summary:** This is a tax exemption for personal property valued under \$3,000 Adoption of this statute is suggested as a means to reduce the cost of tax billing and collection. The average bill exempted under this provision is \$23; since collection of the personal property tax is not aided by a tax lien it can be very time consuming and expensive. Adopting this exemption will eliminate approximately 205 tax bills. This action does not reduce the overall tax levy of the town but transfers the exempted portion of the tax burden from low value personal property to higher valued personal property and real estate.

**Article 20.** To see if the Town will vote to amend Chapter XIV of the Oak Bluffs Recodified General Bylaws pertaining to the police department by establishing a new section as follows or take any other action relative thereto:

### **Police Department**

#### **Executive Summary**

Public Consumption of marijuana or tetrahydrocannabinol.

No person shall smoke, ingest, or otherwise use or consume marijuana or tetrahydrocannabinol (as defined in GL c 94C, sec 1, as amended) while in or upon any street, sidewalk, public way, footway, passageway, stairs, bridge, park, playground, beach, recreation area, boat landing, public building, schoolhouse, school grounds, cemetery, parking lot or any area owned by or under the control of the Town; or in or upon any bus or other passenger conveyance operated by a common carrier; or in any place accessible to the public.

**Article 21.** To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 6.0 Special Regulations of the Oak Bluffs Zoning By-law to add a new Section, Section 6.5, to establish a temporary moratorium for medical marijuana uses in all zoning districts, as follows:

### **6.5 INTERIM REGULATIONS FOR MEDICAL MARIJUANA USES**

**6.5.1 Purpose.** This section is intended to establish a temporary restriction in order to allow the Town adequate time to consider whether to allow facilities associated with the medical use of marijuana, to the extent those facilities are permitted under state law and regulations and, if so, in which areas of the Town and under what conditions the facilities should be allowed. Given that a law permitting the medical use of marijuana within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts became effective on January 1, 2013, and given that the Department of Public Health has yet to promulgate regulations by which facilities that produce, dispense, or cultivate medical marijuana shall be registered and administered, a time-limited restriction, or moratorium, on the establishment of those facilities in Oak Bluffs will provide the opportunity to the Town to study and consider the impact they will have on adjacent uses and on the general public health, safety, and welfare, and to develop zoning and other applicable by-laws or regulations to address these considerations, consistent with statewide regulations and permitting procedures.

**6.5.2 Definition.** A Medical Marijuana Treatment Center shall mean a not-for-profit entity, as defined by Massachusetts law only, that acquires, cultivates, possesses, processes (including development of related products such as food, tinctures, aerosols, oils or ointments), transfers, transports, sells, distributes, dispenses, or administers marijuana, products containing marijuana, related supplies, or educational materials to qualified patients or their personal caregivers, and which is properly licensed and registered by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health under all applicable state laws and regulations.

**6.5.3 Exclusion of Other Marijuana Uses.** The acquisition, cultivation, possession, processing, transfer, transportation, sale, distribution, dispensing, or administration of marijuana, products containing or derived from marijuana, or any related product, shall in no case be considered an accessory use to any other use.

**6.5.4 Interim Restriction/Temporary Moratorium.** Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers shall not be permitted in any zoning district while this Section 6.5 is in effect, as set forth in Section 6.5.5. Use variances for a Medical Marijuana Treatment Center are prohibited.

**6.5.5 Expiration.** This Section 6.5 shall be effective for a period of one year beginning on April 9, 2013, or until such time as the Town enacts superseding zoning amendments governing Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers and any requirements applicable to medical marijuana uses.

### **Planning Board**

**Executive Summary:** This article places a temporary moratorium on the development of medical marijuana uses while the State develops regulations which will determine the requirements of such facilities and points of sale and the Town has had an opportunity to develop reasonable land use regulations based on the rules developed by the State.
